# KGU Program

While the majority of our students are on campus during the school year and do not require housing, there is one group from Kanto-Gakuin University (KGU) in Japan that arrives in McMinnville a week before school starts each year. Each student from KGU needs a place to stay for only one week until campus dormitories open. This is the only time we look for host families for students to stay with. We ask that the host families provide transportation to and from the campus on weekdays, and provide breakfast and dinner for the students every day for that week. The one weekend that falls in that week will be spent with the host family. The host families will be paid a stipend for their effort.
